Mr. Glick has advised a wide variety of companies and trade associations in regard to U.S./Mexico legal questions involving imports, exports, investment, immigration, and transportation. He is also an active developer of Customs Compliance programs for U.S. Corporations.

Mr. Glick is author of five books. **Guide to United States Customs and Trade Laws, 2<sup>nd</sup> ed** was published in 1997. Other publications include **Understating the North American Free Trade Agreement, 2<sup>nd</sup> ed** (1988), **Multilateral Trade Negotiations: World Trade After the Tokyo Round** (1984), **“Settling Unfair Trade Practice Cases Under Section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930,” 21 Harvard International Law Journal 129** (1980).
